

At Park Place Assisted Living, the health, safety and comfort of our community members are always top priorities. Never has that been more true than right now as we all deal with the coronavirus (COVID-19).

Our staff and team are doing everything they possibly can to clean and protect our residents! We follow all CDC, Federal, State and County guidelines to care for our team and residents.

We have implemented the following policies, which we ask all residents, friends & family, and anyone else involved with our community to follow:

VISITORS – All visitors must be sure to wash their hands and use hand sanitizer before entering the premises and must use your family members direct door to enter the building to minimize the number of people in our common areas.

GROUP ACTIVITIES – Life enrichment activities will continue as planned. Groups are requested to wear a face covering and practicing social distancing.

DAILY STAFF HEALTH SCREENINGS - Our team members will be health-screened daily and sent home for any respiratory symptoms, including coughing, wheezing, shortness of breath, runny nose, sore throat, or fever.

Here are additional steps our staff members are taking:

Monitoring & following CDC, Federal, State & County COVID-19 guidelines, and updating our response plan regularly as new guidelines are issued.

Ensuring our housekeeping department is regularly cleaning and disinfecting frequently touched objects and surfaces.

Maintaining hand sanitizer dispensers in various areas throughout our communities (as we regularly do throughout the year).

Communicating with and educating our residents. Here are some examples:

We have frequently reminded residents that the first defense against coronavirus is proper handwashing, which includes 20 seconds of rubbing all skin surfaces of the fingers and hands with soap. Residents are reminded that 20 seconds is approximately how long it takes to hum the “Happy Birthday” song twice, from beginning to end.

We have instructed residents to avoid touching their eyes, nose, and mouth and cover a cough or sneeze with a tissue which is then immediately disposed of, or to cough or sneeze into an elbow or upper sleeve, not into hands.
